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Executive Summary

District Strategic Plan 2025

Orange County Public Schools is the ninth-largest school district in the United States and the fourth largest in Florida. The district serves more than 206,000 students at 202 schools and is one of the largest employers in Central Florida with more than 25,000 team members.

Vision: To ensure every student has a promising and successful future.

Mission: With the support of families and the community, we create enriching and diverse pathways to lead our students to success.

School Collection Development Plan

Lancaster Elementary School serves 563 students enrolled in Kindergarten through fifth grades. The student population's ethnicity is made up of 77% Hispanic and 23% Non-Hispanic students. Additionally, we serve a diverse population made up of 70% White, 25% Black, 1% Native, 1% Asian, 1% Pacific, and 3% Multicultural students.

The administration includes Principal Natasha Pender and Assistant Principal Ms. Nicole Bullen. Lancaster Elementary School is proud to offer the many special programs which provide students with opportunities. These include Literacy Week, SECME, Book -It, Battle of the Books.

A thorough analysis of the current media center collection at Lancaster Elementary School indicates that the average age of the collection is 2007 and the number of books per student is 18. The <u>American Association for School Libraries</u> has established a criteria for a highly effective media center that includes a ratio of 15-20 books available per student in the collection. At this time, Lancaster Elementary School does meet the recommended standards for the number of books per student.

The analysis of the collection also revealed the following areas of strengths and concerns:

- Our 3rd and 4th grade students made significant gains on the FSA ELA and Math assessments.
- Aged titles in nonfiction should be weeded as appropriate and replaced.
- Hispanic and Latinx titles need to be added to the collection
- Increase in nonfiction titles: animals, space, dinosaurs, social science sports, computer science and a variety of religious/myths is needed.
- Increase in popular everyone (picture books) is needed.
- Increase in second and third grade fiction titles is needed.
- Biography section needs more relevant figures.


School Analysis

Notes

- The average age of Literature is 2003 however, classic literature skews this date.
- We only have 31 titles in Computer Science, Information & General Works and for that category they are aged.
- The average age of the Social Science titles is 2003 and that category needs more updated versersions.
- Graphic Novels are an increasingly popular section and students need more variety.
- Religious texts are limited and lack representation of diverse faiths.
- The Recreation category has a minimal variety of Sports and are available only in a few reading levels.

Representation Analysis

To deepen focus on strategic collection development, specific sections of the collection were analyzed in detail to determine whether the media center collection reflects and represents various points of view and experiences. The goal is to provide a balanced collection that can be both a mirror, to reflect a reader's experience, and a window, so readers can experience different viewpoints.

Results

Based on the available school data of Lancaster Elementary School in comparison to Collection Analysis results, it was found that:

Summary

After completing a deeper, targeted analysis of the representation section of the TitleWise report, it was determined that:

- Based on our student demographics, we currently do not have enough titles representing HIspanic/Latinx culture, authors, etc. This is a need in our collection.
- Of the 150 titles in our collection reflecting Hispanic/Latinx culture, many are duplicate titles, i.e. we have multiple copies.
